- Nominee's area(s) of contribution (must be for one or more of the four categories)
- Special achievements and impact
- Awards and other recognition previously received

Additional letters of support, newspaper articles, etc. that support the nomination may also be attached.

Dr. Alice Holloway Young was a pioneering educator whose remarkable career spanned more than five decades, dedicated to uplifting and empowering young people through education. She earned her Bachelor's degree from Bennett College, followed by Master's and Doctoral degrees from the University of Rochester, laying the foundation for a lifetime of leadership and innovation.

In 1952, Dr. Young broke racial barriers by becoming one of the first African American classroom teachers in the Rochester City School District. Her trailblazing path continued as she became the district's first African American reading specialist, vice principal, principal, Title I director, and central office administrator. She played a pivotal role in shaping the district's integration efforts, including the creation of the groundbreaking Urban Suburban Program, which remains a model of educational equity.

As a founding trustee of Monroe Community College in 1961, Dr. Young further expanded her impact. She served as Chair of the Board from 1978 to 1998, helping to transform the lives of thousands of students through her visionary leadership.

Her legacy has been honored in many ways, most notably in 2021 when Nathaniel Rochester School No. 3 was renamed Dr. Alice Holloway Young School No. 3, a lasting tribute to her contributions and influence.

Dr. Young passed away on April 17, 2024, at the age of 100, leaving behind an enduring legacy as a role model, barrier-breaker, and champion of educational opportunity.
